Mid-Winter Board Meeting

The meeting was held January 9 at the Smith Homestead in Jacobus with 13 members in attendance and two via teleconference.

The board approved minutes of the September meeting, the treasurer's report and the investment strategy update. The 2021 budget was approved, with talk about pricing for this year's reunion meal possibly increasing. As with last year, a \$25 figure was discussed, with several directors voicing opinions of holding that figure to \$20 or less. The \$25 figure would be one that would come close to keeping the Association from losing money on the reunion.

Director Jean Robinson reported for the historical committee, recommending printing the list of deaths in the family that would have appeared in the 2020 reunion program in the April newsletter and possibly continuing to appear each year in one of the newsletters. The 2021 reunion program will then include a list from 2020 and 2021.

Also for the historical committee, director Philip Glatfelter again noted the large amount of interesting information that Harry Gladfelter has accumulated for the program, "Glattfelders and Their Patents." The challenge will be how to present that information in a timely way, with the possibility of spreading it out over two years.

For the property committee report, Phil suggested that the door on the FamilyHaus / Refreshment Stand should be replaced. And new bids for the Armand Gladfelter maintenance shed roof will be sought in the spring.

In continuing business, Tom noted that the Association needed to move forward on a collaboration in placing a historical plaque about the Homestead house and Bob Kinsley's role in its

preservation along the Heritage Rail Trail.

Phil has been checking with two York County historians on getting H. I. Glatfelter's journal published. There are several options available.

The 2021 Reunion

This year's reunion is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, July 31, at Heimwald Park. As with last year, the effects of the coronavirus pandemic could change when or if the reunion is held.

Merchandise will again be offered at the reunion, and is always available from the Association's website, www.glattfelder.org.

Harry Gladfelter, from the Philadelphia area, has collected a wealth of information on Glattfelder descendants, which will be the topic of this year's reunion program, "Glattfelders and Their Patents." Harry, who has 16 patents, began searching for Glattfelder descendants several years ago and, with his continuing research, the list continues to grow.

Harry will take a main role in the program, which will again feature a PowerPoint presentation. He expects several Glattfelder descendants to attend and speak about their accomplishments.

The current patio consists of approximately 5,000 bricks, including more than 1,250 that are engraved. A breakdown of bricks under each son of Casper, along with other statistics and facts about the patio, is listed on the Association website.

Trees

Last year, a tree project, graciously donated by the family of Honorary Friend Bob Kinsley, took care of trimming and removing numerous trees at Heimwald Park.

In late fall, there was a different kind of tree project, as 10 seedlings were planted.

As part of a special deal offered with a donation to the Arbor Day Foundation, board member Philip Glatfelter donated the trees, which he planted in various spots in the park.

The seedlings include: White flowering dogwood and two Washington Hawthorns along the east side, heading out toward the driveway; an American redbud at the south end; a white flowering dogwood in the southwest corner; a sargent crabapple on the west side near the pavilion extension; a crape myrtle at the corner of the pavilion near the plaques; and a sargent crabapple in the area between the refreshment stand and Armand Gladfelter Maintenance shed.

The impact of the trees won't be seen for several years, but we expect it will eventually help beautify our "Home Woods."

Musical ties

For most years, if not every year, there has been some kind of entertainment at our Reunions. In recent years, during the Saturday programs, the Brodbecks Band has performed.

While the Glattfelder Reunion has been held for 115 years, the Brodbecks Band can boast of an even longer existence. The band has been performing since 1878 -- and Glattfelders have been part of the entire show.

Here is a story that appeared on the band's website:

70 years of service

One of our members, Dale Gladfelter, was honored recently for being a member of the Brodbecks Band for 70 years! Also, his family has had a member in the percussion section since the band was founded 140 years ago!

Congratulations, Dale, for your dedication and service for 70 years of service to the Band!

Family Traditions

For the Gladfelter Family, playing drums in the Brodbecks Band is a tradition that dates back to 1878 when the Band was founded. Ephraim was the first to start playing drums in the band. His son, Charles Luther, was next, followed by his sons Curtis and Daniel, all playing drums. Curtis' son Lavern and Daniel's son Dale also played drums in the Band. Luther's son John also played in the Band, but he played trumpet.

Dale is the last Gladfelter still playing drums in the Brodbecks Band. Congratulations Dale and the Gladfelter Family!

President's Message

The January directors meeting was very well attended, as is typical for that first meeting of the new calendar year. For many years, we have been enjoying the cozy hospitality provided by the "Smith Homestead" house in Jacobus. The wood paneled walls and large oak dining room table create a warm ambience well suited to a meeting about "family business." Indeed, the setting feels more like family than business.

But of course, the meeting does address the business of running a family association of more than a century of corporate existence. And from a business perspective, the year 2020 could be best summarized by the opening words of Charles Dickens' <u>A Tale of Two Cities</u>, "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times."

From a financial standpoint, 2020 was one of the best of times. There was a strong positive cash flow. Our association was blessed to have received a very generous in-kind donation from our neighbors, the Robert Kinsley properties, through the removal of many dead or dangerous trees and the grinding of several of their stumps.

But the positive cash flow was in no small part from the past year being the worst of times, with the world being gripped by fear and uncertainty surrounding the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and the frequently changing and sometimes contradictory responses by various levels of government. Those uncertainties led to decisions first to postpone and later to cancel the 2020 Reunion.

The paradox is that the cancellation of the reunion was the cause of the financial gain. Or, simply put, the Reunion does not "pay its way" by meal reservation fees.

Rental of tables and chairs, portable toilets, stipends for the Brodbecks Band, the sound system technician, fire police and van drivers are all reunion expenses far over and above the cost of food provided by the caterers. And of course, Heimwald Park itself has the intangible expenses of property taxes and insurance which amount to \$8 per day times 365.

The dilemma faced by the directors in the cozy homestead setting was, and remains, how to find a balance point between reasonable reservation fees for the reunion and ensuring that those fees cover more of the ancillary expenses associated with that event. In the fairly recent past, such discussion was not necessary because there were several major donors whose annual contributions of \$1,000 or more provided a major portion of the yearly budget. But these donors are now all deceased and a new generation has yet to appear to carry on their legacy of generosity.

The discussion will surely be revisited at the May directors' meeting, at which time the reservation fees for the 2021 Reunion -- slated to be held July 31 -- will be established. In the meantime, your insights and suggestions are welcomed and encouraged.

And likewise, your donations of any size.

Royal ties?

A year ago or so, during communications between director Philip Glatfelter and our "Glattfelders and Their Patents" researcher Harry Gladfelter, Harry passed along to Phil information he received about a current member of the British Royal Family. It kind of fit in with all the amazing discoveries Harry was uncovering.

In 2019, Harry became acquainted on Facebook with a Heinz Keller, who lives in northern New Jersey but was raised in Glattfelden, returns to Switzerland yearly and has an interest in the Glattfelders. (Heinz and his wife were planning to attend the 2020 Reunion and may come to this year's reunion.) At one point, he passed this along: "According to my Swiss sources, the new Duchess of Sussex, Meghan Markle, has her roots in my home town of Glattfelden, Switzerland, and [their] names [were] Glattfelder before emigrating to the United States [many, many] years and generations ago."

Keller also passed along a screenshot of a story in Blick, a Swiss-German newspaper in Zurich, Switzerland, with headlines, in German: "Prince Harry's bride has Swiss roots; Hello, Your Highness; The ancestors of the future Duchess of Sussex were called Glattfelder and come from Glattfelden ZH. The parish president is almost bursting with pride; He's inviting Megan and Harry for their honeymoon."

And more recently, in a February 28 post on the "I am a descendant of the Glatfelters" Facebook page, a Stephanie Glotfelty added this:

"I'm not 100% sure about this -- if anyone wants to check the documentation to see if I've missed something, please do! -- but I think Meghan Markle (wife of Prince Harry) descends from Casper Glattfelder. He's her 7th great grandfather (and mine -- which would make us 8th cousins)."

The possible connection goes like this: Casper; Felix; Barbara Glattfelder (1788-1868), married to Jacob Hovis; Catharine Hovis (1812-1878?), married to Conrad Markle; Isaac Markle (1840-1899); George B. Markle (1864-1923); Isaac Thomas Markle (1891-1972); Gordon Arnold Markle (1918-1982); Thomas Wayne Markle (1944-); Meghan Markle (1981-).

Stephanie noted that "one hiccup may be with which Isaac Markle is the son of Catharine and Conrad -- there are a few Isaac Markles in the same area born around the same time. There is a son Isaac to that couple listed in the *Glattfelders in America* book."

A historic beginning

Dr. Charles H. Glatfelter, our longtime board member and historian (who passed away in 2013), included another organization among his passions. In addition to being a Gettysburg College professor, Dr. Charles was the executive director of the Adams County Historical Society for 42 years.

ACHS was located in Schmucker Hall on the Gettysburg Lutheran Seminary campus during those years, moving out in 2011 when renovation began for the Seminary Ridge Museum. (The entrance to the museum is named The Dr. Charles H. Glatfelter Welcome Center.) The society has been located in the Wolf House on the Seminary campus since.

But on March 6, ACHS held a groundbreaking for its new home, located just north of Gettysburg on Route 34 (Biglerville Road). That site is less than a mile from Dr. Charles' residence for over 50 years, 36 Apple Ave.

Quite appropriately, one of the features of the new building will be the Glatfelter Reading Room.

While Dr. Charles would be pleased that the historical society will have a modern, well-equipped home, it could probably be said that he'd also miss the society's longtime home.

A military honor

Several years ago, we received an inquiry about Earl Ivan Gladfelter. There was some correspondence, but little more. Though more information was sought on Earl, what was provided is worth telling.

Steven Cummings, a retired Staff Sergeant of the Michigan Army National Guard, a veteran of the U.S. Army and the U.S. Navy, is the historian for the Milan, Michigan, American Legion Post 268, and is the one who made the inquiry. The post is named after Earl.

Here is some of what Steven provided:

Earl Gladfelter was born July 21, 1897, in North Baltimore, Ohio. Sometime during his life, his family moved to Toledo, Ohio, which was his home of record. At age 19, he joined the Michigan National Guard's First Field Signal Battalion. On July 15, 1917, the First Signal Battalion was ordered to active duty. At Camp MacArthur in Waco, Texas, all units of the Michigan National Guard and the Wisconsin National guard were joined together to form the 32nd Division. The Michigan First Field Signal Battalion and the Wisconsin First Field Signal Battalion were combined to form the 107th Field Signal Battalion.

Training at Camp MacArthur included bareback horse riding, trench construction and fighting, and gas mask training. Earl's unit left Camp MacArthur in January, 1918 for Camp Merrit, New Jersey. On January 23, the 107th Field Signal Battalion left New Jersey and eventually landed in Havre, France, on February 8. In May, the unit left for the front.

In July, the unit was sent forward to the battle of Chateau Thierry, sometimes known as the Second Battle of the Marne. One soldier wrote in his diary in October 1918: These were the days "in the lines" hard fighting all the time. It is during this session that the old 32nd Division met the Krenhilde line of trenches ... but the boys smashed through them. 127 Inf. captured town of Gesnes. 125 Inf. [captured town] of Romagne and other villages. ... Sometime during this offensive, Private Earl Gladfelter was wounded in action. He died October 4th.

Earl's body was buried there in France, probably in a hospital cemetery. It took nearly three years for him to be repatriated to American soil. He now lies in Truro Cemetery in Columbus Grove, Ohio.

So, why then, would an Ohio soldier be named as the namesake for a Michigan American Legion Post? It is simple: His name was requested by the founding members of Post 268. Some of them must have fought and served with Earl Gladfelter, and wanted his name and sacrifice to be remembered for all time. In the end, when you are under fire, soldiers fight for each other, and it is never forgotten.

A tragic incident

In early March, all of central Pennsylvania -- and many locales beyond -- became acquainted with the name "Glatfelters Station" because of an intensive search operation involving specialized units from the Pennsylvania State Police, supplemented by many dozens of volunteers.

The effort continued for six days, utilizing search-and-rescue dogs, helicopters and kayaks. On Friday, March 13, the body of 29-year-old Nicole Elizabeth Ebaugh was recovered in the vicinity. She had parked her vehicle in the York County Heritage Rail Trail parking lot, which is leased from our Association. The cause of death was a self-inflicted gun shot.

Ms. Ebaugh was NOT recovered from the Heimwald Park grounds; that area had been searched and cleared early on.

Her family has requested that donations be made to place a bench in her memory near the parking lot.

May all connected with this tragedy take comfort from the Psalmist's words, "the Lord is near to the brokenhearted, and those who are crushed in spirit He saves." (Psalm 34:18).

Glattfelder Places


One of the topics of programs that was up for discussion in recent years was Glattfelder names and places. While that might be an actual program in the future, here are a couple of places to start with (let us know of any other Glattfelder places for future use):



Glatfelter Hall on the campus of Gettysburg College, named after the founder of the Glatfelter Paper Company, formerly of Spring Grove, Pa., Philip H. Glatfelter. Philip was a trustee of the college. He is descended from Casper through son Felix.



Gladfelter Hall on the campus of Temple University, Philadelphia, Pa., named after former university president Dr. Millard E. Gladfelter. He is descended from Casper through son Felix.





Glatfelter Memorial Field, Columbia, Pa., named for Lieutenant Richard Glatfelter who died during World War I. He was the uncle of longtime CGAA director Philip H. Glatfelter II, and is descended from Casper through son Casper.
