Mid-Winter Board Meeting

The meeting was held January 10 at the Smith Homestead in Jacobus, Pa. Twelve board members were in attendance, with two participating by teleconference. Three were unable to attend.

Vice president Judy Martin reported for the Executive Committee. The budget was presented and approved, and committee assignments remained the same. It was recommended that a postcard be sent out to reconnect with family members on old mailing lists with whom we have lost contact. Philip Glatfelter expressed his willingness to pay for the mailing. More on the postcard and accompanying web survey later in the newsletter.

John L. Gladfelter, reporting for the brick patio committee, noted that there are replaced bricks at Heimwald Park as well as others that Art Glatfelter may have stored at his farm. Those bricks should be moved to the park, though the eventual fate of those bricks has not been determined. In addition, Philip was updating statistics about the patio that will be noted on the website once they are complete. More on the brick patio later in the newsletter.

Reporting for the Communication Committee, Larry Gladfelter Jr. passed out Google Analytic reports on the website. More on the reports later in the newsletter. President Tom thanked Dallas Smith and Philip for their continued work on the newsletters.

Philip, reporting for the Historical Committee, said that work has been started on reunion program information dealing with Glattfelders in the wars, with World War II being this year's topic. It was suggested that period music be included at the reunion. Jean Robinson has already been in contact with a family member who may provide a uniform along with other information.

Nelson Brenneman reported for the Property Committee. Soft spots exist on the park grounds. Eliminating these areas will likely involve use of a backhoe. Also, some trees and branches need to be removed.

Ben Miller reported for the Education Committee. He read thank-you letters from the recent recipients of the Ives Bricker Scholarship.

Brick Patio

The current patio consists of approximately 5,000 bricks, including about 1,100 engraved bricks. A breakdown of bricks under each son of Casper, along with other statistics and facts on the patio, will be listed on the website in the near future.

For example, Felix's line is the most populated, with 447 engraved bricks or 39.8 percent, while Solomon is second with 232 (20.6 percent). There are 209 bricks for Henry (18.6 percent), 142 for John (12.6), 48 for Casper (4.3) and 13 for Michael (1.1). The John Peter and Friends line has 36 bricks (3.0).

Obituaries

As the family tree continues to expand, tracking family members and accumulating corresponding obituaries has become more and more difficult. Members of the historical committee are continuing the task as best they can.

However, the list of deaths for reunion programs will be limited to those with the most common Glattfelder names in their obituaries, and others will be listed by request. Reunion revisited

The Rev. Adam Stump, Samuel F. Glatfelter and Granville Glatfelter gathered for a meeting which had a large significance to the Glattfelder family.

At one point during their discussion, the three agreed, "Let's have a reunion."

And so they did.

That meeting, in December 1905, set in motion what has happened for 109 years: the Glattfelders Reunion. This year will be the 110th reunion.

The meeting of Stump and the two Glatfelters actually happened twice, in a manner of speaking. Ten years ago – can it actually be that long ago – the 100th Reunion was held with great fanfare. Among the highlights of that reunion was a dramatic presentation in which Adam, (portrayed by Rev. J. Richard Glatfelter), Sam (portrayed by Robert Prosperi) and Granville (portrayed by Richard L. Glatfelter) again met to discuss plans for a reunion.

In the third and final scene of the presentation, the three talk about those in attendance — "There must be thousands," said Granville — at the Reunion, held that first year at Messersmith's Woods. Out of the approximately 450 in attendance at the 2005 Reunion, numerous attendees participated in the third scene by standing, identifying themselves and relating who in their family was at the first reunion. Among those was Thomas Clodfelter from Brookfield, Ill., who, filled with emotion, was able to say, "I'm descended from Michael. I'm most certainly the first person ever to make that claim at a Glattfelders Reunion."

The Reunion Weekend included numerous events, such as a tour of the Glatfelter paper mill in Spring Grove (157 in attendance), a Friday reception (224), a Saturday bus tour (143) and a Saturday dinner (234). The reunion included descendants from 21 states, as well as representatives from Glattfelden, Switzerland. Former Pennsylvania Governor George M. Leader and former U.S. Representative William F. Goodling, both Glattfelder descendants, were also in attendance.

In addition to the reunion anniversary, it was noted in 2005 that the Glattfelder Education Fund, Inc. was celebrating its 10th year. That makes this year the 20th for the worthy cause. This non-profit corporation was set up to receive and administer the \$100,000 bequest from Charles A. Bricker (1912-1993), a Glattfelder descendant through both of his parents, to be used for scholarships to students pursuing an undergraduate education.

Gone but not forgotten

Two recent deaths of significance include former Directory Emeritus Joann C. Jones and prominent York attorney Henry B. Leader.

Jones of Armagh, Pa., died March 26 at age 81. She was the first descendant of Solomon to serve as a Director, and the first person living outside of the Adams-York-Lancaster region to serve. Despite a 300-mile, five-hour round trip, Joann faithfully attended our meetings and never asked for (but graciously accepted) the ability to join us by teleconference in her final years on the board.

Leader, the brother of former Pennsylvania Governor George M. Leader, was a Glattfelder descendant through two lines. He did a great service to the Association in 2005-2006 when, free of charge, he orchestrated the reconstitution of the Bupp's Union Cemetery Trustees, an effort initiated through our desire to place a replication monument in the cemetery for Casper's son (and Henry's ancestor) Felix.

Big screen relative

There are a fair share of prominent names who can trace their ancestry to Casper Glattfelder. There are almost certainly some we don't know about.

Now, we know about one more.

A recent email from Laurelai K. Nowicki (Peters) revealed that 1950s actor James Dean is descended from John Peter, Casper's brother.

Dean earned fame as a cultural icon after starring in the movie *Rebel without a Cause* in 1955, in which he portrayed troubled teenager Jim Stark. The other two roles that defined his stardom were loner Cal Trask in *East of Eden*

(1955) and surly ranch hand Jett Rink in *Giant* (1956).

Dean's legendary status was cemented when he died prematurely in a car crash in September 1955, at the age of 24. He became the first actor to receive a posthumous Academy Award nomination for Best Actor. In 1999, the American Film Institute ranked him the 18th best male movie star on its 100 Years...100 Stars list.

Lauralei informed us that while doing family research years ago she learned of Dean's relationship. Here's how:

John Peter's daughter Barbara, who married Felix Hildebrand, had a daughter Catherine, who married Jacob Schmuck.

Catherine and Jacob had a son Eli, who was born in York County, married Margaret Felton and had a daughter Agnes, who was born in Indiana in 1849.

Agnes married Levi L. Wilson, and they had a son, John William. He married Minnie Mae Slaughter and they had a daughter Mildred Marie.

Mildred married Winton A. Dean; they were the parents of James Byron Dean.

Possibly some of our Glattfelder relatives already knew of this tie to the family. If any family members know of other such famous Glattfelders, certainly let us know.

Lighting the way

Association president Thomas Shelley has been involved with law enforcement officers for many years. He has seen what good those officers do while also dealing with the tragedies that befall them.

In January, as part of National Law Enforcement Appreciation Day, Shelley honored officers who have fallen in the line of duty by stringing more than 2,500 blue lights on his Loganville, Pa., property.

"It's a public statement of faith," Shelley said in a York Daily Record article.

Shelley said in the article that several of the bulbs could be for officers in York County killed while on duty. Two in particular had their

own bulbs: Northern Regional Officer David Tome and York County Sheriff's Deputy Ed "Skip" Schroeder Jr.

Tome's death struck close to home, being the grandson of one of Shelley's neighbors.

"There is one group of people holding protests saying 'black lives matter.' There is another group of people holding counter-protests saying 'blue lives matter.' What we really need to start saying is: 'All lives matter'," Shelley said.

Stretching far and wide

At the January board meeting, director and webmaster Larry Gladfelter Jr. passed out Google Analytics reports for the association website for the last three months, and pointed out some interesting numbers.

Obviously, the most number of sessions on the site were from the United States. Perhaps surprising was that nine other countries showed up on the list. Canada and Mexico were not too surprising, along with the Glattfelder home country, Switzerland. But others, such as Italy, Russia, Spain and Portugal, were less expected.

Least expected on the list? Brazil. It ranked second to the U.S. for sessions.

That could be an anomaly, but if the Glattfelder line extends there, it would be most interesting to learn how.

A quick look at a few other numbers: Of the 1,097 sessions, 599 users accessed the site using Chrome and 183 used Safari, and 879 got online from their desktop with 146 by mobile device.

Cub Scouts

Again this year, Cub Scout Pack 69 plans to have a camp-out at Heimwald Park the weekend of May 15 - 17. Former board member Bryan Miller assists the Cub Scouts.

In exchange for use of the park, the scouts perform some work there. This time, they will paint the rest of the pavilion posts which were not painted before, and remove fallen branches.

Including the leaders, about 40 people will be involved in this win-win endeavor. Our only costs are the portable toilets and the paint.

Financial Page

In 2014, earnings on our investments were \$ 492 above 2013. The majority of these investments are from the Endowment Fund. This income helps to support the general expenses of Heimwald Park. Our Endowment Fund now stand at \$ 81,761.

General contributions were up \$ 557, but since we did not have a bus trip and did not collect much from merchandise sales, our total income was down by \$ 2,194.

The installation of new rain gutters and toppers for the park pavilions was the most significant cost in 2014. This cost was \$ 3,970 and is included in park maintenance expenses. Since we now have a "paid" webmaster, our website costs also increased. All other expenses were fairly consistent.

With expenses higher than income last year, the Association had a net loss of \$ 2,292 in the General Fund, which stands at \$ 27,377 as of December 31, 2014.
