(crown) Die Krone bedeutet dass ein Vorfahre Goldschmiedemeister in Zurich war und ist dies das Symbol dieses Handwerks. Das Schwert (Sword) Gerechtigkeit (Recht) Sterne bedeuten Licht und Glanz des Geschlechtes. Die 2 Meierisli und der Dreiberg haben keine besondere Bedeutung. Das Hauptsymbol im Wappen ist die Krone die auf den Beruf hinweist  
Wappen, armore, coat of arms.

Brisure:

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The crest signifies that an ancestor who was a goldsmith master lived in Zurich and this is the symbol of his handwork or trade. The sword represents justice. The stars signify light and the lustre of the family. The two lily-of-the-valley sprays and the three hills have no particular meaning. The outstanding symbol in the Coat of Arms is the Gold crown which indicates the profession. Translated from the Zurich Coat of Arms book by Dietrich Meyer dated 1606.

Items not in the English translation of the Glattfelder Coat of Arms. On the outline of the crest it reads "On three hills over a crown decorated with a sword and aside of two lilies of the valley over two stars. Helm means Helmet: Stechelm means pointed helmet. Heimzier means artisan or helmet maker. Fehlt in D Meyer indicates that the name of the maker is missing in D. Meyer's book on Swiss Heraldry. Urk. is an abbreviation of urkunde which means a document. Nachweisbar seit can be translated totally as a document which can be traced back to the year 1315 A.D. Heimatori means place of origin or source of authenticity. Wappendeutung indicates the meaning or explanation - des Wappens of the Coat of Arms of the Glattfelder family. Quelle refers to the source of the authentic information which is in the Zurcherwappenbuch- The Zurich Coat of Arms by Dietrich Meyer dated 1606.
