Mid-Winter Board meeting

The meeting was held at Christ UMC in Jacobus, Pa. Directors in attendance were Tom Shelley, Judy Martin, Jean Robinson, Philip Glatfelter, Bonnie Baim, Bonnie Flaharty, Dean Gladfelter, Stephen Gladfelter, Rick Hoover, Larry Gladfelter Jr., Harry Gladfelter and John Shelley. Board Members who attended via conference call were Pamela Tuscany, Chris Glatfelter, Rick Gladfelter and Ben Miller. Sarah Melcher was excused.

President Tom Shelley opened the meeting at 10:05 a.m. in prayer.

Among the correspondence from the Contact Us form on the website, Larry shared the following:

- On October 16, George R. Gladfelter of Topeka, Kan., asked if we have a family coat of arms that is poster size? "I have the parchment size now. Would like a larger display. What about the coat of arms on a shield?" The message was forwarded to Phil who responded to George, telling him that we do not have any larger coat of arms and his best avenue would probably be to do any enlargements himself.
- On October 28, Susan Dantema-Ebbs wrote: "... I am a librarian in Castle Rock, Colorado. I was researching databases and thought it would be fun to do a mother/daughter linage starting with my daughter and me. This is what I found: Starting with Sybilla Billwiller (1480-1543), this is the epic mother/daughter story! 8 generations in Switzerland until the brave souls of Casper and Elizabeth Glatfelter moved to America. ..." Her line includes Anna Eva (Glatfelter) Jauler (1740-1798), after which the Glatfelter name disappears. Her ancestor Elizabeth (Boyd) Shultz left

Pennsylvania in the early 1800s and traveled to Missouri. She grew up in California.

"I understand that the six brothers are listed, but I was wondering about the daughters. From what I have gathered, Elizabeth died on the ship to America along with her youngest child Johannes (John). Anna Eva would have only been 3 years old. There is a reference in Casper's will to an Anna and I'm wondering if this is her. ... Would you have any other information about Anna Eva (Glatfelter) Jauler?"

As has been mentioned at times in the past, while it appears Casper had daughters, there is little evidence of them.

● On December 2, we received a message from jaleza5@gmail.com: "Interested in birth location for Gottfried Glattfelder b. 1859 Switzerland m. Anna Hilpert in Iowa, USA. She was b. 31 December 1867 in Zurich Switzerland."

Larry replied: "You can find information by following this link:

https://www.ancestry.com/genealogy/records/gottf ried-scott-glattfelder-24-30x1q0. The town of Glattfelden is located just north of Zurich, very close to the border with Germany. I hope you find this helpful!"

● On December 8, we received a message from katieannpratt@gmail.com, saying she believe she's related to Casper Glattfelder. Her grandmother's name was Wilma Rodeheaver (name from the Rothenhoeffer family), who was born in 1923. The line includes Marion Glotfelty (1863-1946), Jesse Glotfelty (1836-1911) and William Glotfelty. "I have William's parents as John Glatterfelder and Mary Hare Herr, but I believe Mary was actually married to John's brother." She said they are children of Solomon.

Marion is the closest relative of hers with the Glotfelty name, so she was wondering if we would be able to confirm her relation to Casper?

Jutta Creager was able to supply information to her.

- On December 25, our friend in Glattfelden, Koni Ulrich, sent Christmas greetings to the Association.
- On January 11, Mike Avery sent a message saying his seventh great grandfather was Johan Glattfelder and he was looking to contact relatives from Pennsylvania.

Larry responded with greetings from Pennsylvania.

Rick reported for the Investment Committee that the Association's investments are still up 30% since changing our strategy, but down from last year. The market has been fairly stable and an investment ladder has been implemented.

The Education Fund stands at \$125,000. Scholarships are allotted from the returns of a \$100,000 bequest by Charles Bricker in 1993.

The Executive Committee prepared the 2023 budget prior to the Board Meeting, which was adopted and passed unanimously.

Phil reported for the Brick Patio Committee, noting that there were numerous orders and inquiries since last year's Reunion and there may be about 20 new brick orders this year. The patio was in good shape, though there was still much of the winter yet to go.

For the Communications Committee, Larry continues to manage and update our website and Facebook group. The website is primarily accessed from the United States, along with France, Switzerland, the United Kingdom and Germany. The greatest number of hits is after the Newsletter email notification is sent out. The notification for the fall Newsletter went out on November 30 to 518 recipients. The number of subscribers is now 528.

A scanner was purchased for the association. It was used to scan the "Claudia and Evan Family" book and some photos to date. Larry hoped to coordinate a visit to the archives at the York County History Center with Jean and Phil in the near future. (See more on this later in the Newsletter.)

For the Historical Committee, Phil said he was at York County History Center recently and that we need to continue to weed out items in our archives that are not necessary to keep. He had talked to two volunteers, who he had not previously met. It turns out one is a Glattfelder relative.

Head archivist Nicole Smith said she will facilitate any moves as needed.

For the Property Committee, Tom shared that the Armand Gladfelter utility building's roof needs to be replaced. Local contractors will be contacted to get estimates.

Dean said he will replant impatiens as he did last year. He also shared a drawing of trees to potentially plant to beautify the park.

Reunion ideas were shared and discussed. The Reunion program topic will be "Glattfelders and their Art." Harry shared what he has done to date and some of the people he has contacted.

Judy has been investigating food options. She said that we will probably need to raise our prices if we get a catered meal. More work on the food options will be done at the May meeting.

Dean moved we drop the Brodbecks Band and concentrate on family. The motion passed unanimously.

For the Education Fund, Ben shared he had six inquiries for the Yves Bricker Scholarship, but only two applied. He noted that the fund will support two scholarships.

In continuing business, Phil is still working on H.I.'s Journal and shared an advance copy with the board. Tom said he looked over Phil's work and was very impressed. The hope is that the journal will be available for this year's Reunion.

Deb Krebs contacted Rick about a Rhine River Cruise with a few days in Switzerland, finishing in Glattfelden. The trip will be sometime in 2024. (See more on the Glattfelden trip later in the Newsletter).

2023 Reunion

This year's Reunion is scheduled for Saturday, July 29 at Heimwald Park.

Harry Gladfelter continued his wonderful work about Glattfelder descendants that resulted in the two-part program, "Glattfelders and Their Patents," last year and in 2021. During that time, his research uncovered Glattfelder descendants in several other fields. This year, the program will be "Glattfelders and their Art."

One of the artists Harry uncovered is Todd Gladfelter. Todd is a wood carver and chainsaw

artist of some renown and his wife Cindy is an author of nine books. Todd had a serious accident 15 months ago and was left paralyzed. He has been working extremely hard with family, friends and professionals to get back to walking and living life as normally as possible.

Their son Bryce is an illustrator artist and daughter Sierra is an environmentalist.

Cindy's Facebook page is a journal on Todd's everyday progress and is being followed by

Glattfelders here and in Europe.

President's Message

The threshold of every year should be a time for reflection, a sober consideration of the good which we are able to accomplish and an honest acknowledgement of our many missed opportunities, if not outright refusals to lend a hand.

The beginning of this year brought the jarring realization that you — through the Directors — have entrusted me with the leadership of our Association for 15 years now, becoming 16; a term which exceeds that of my three immediate predecessors, all of blessed memory: Rev. J. Richard Glatfelter; Roy D. Gladfelter; and Dr. Charles Glatfelter.

In fact, only two other Presidents of this Association have served a longer term: H.I. Gladfelter, who served for 18 years, and Auburn, who served for 21 years.

The further realization that, of our current Directors, only Vice-President Judy Martin and I have terms that began in "19-something" was a stark reminder that very few of us now hold the "institutional memory"

It is the preservation of memory, not just of our venerable Association, but of the Seven Valleys and York County communities at large which is swiftly leading to one of the high points of my tenure: The "on demand" publication of the memoir of founding Director and, later, Association President H.I. Gladfelter.

H.I.'s Journal and memoirs were entrusted to this Association decades ago and had existed only as a crudely typewritten collection until, during the first decade of this new century, the Historical Committee enlisted the secretarial skills of a descendant of John Peter to transform the analog pages into a digital form which has now been distributed among the Directors on many devices in multiple locations.

This journal offers personal reflections on growing up near the village of Hanover Junction, watching that tranquil town be transformed into a way station for the wounded following the battle of Gettysburg and the boom and bust of industrialization which followed in the ensuing decades.

The latter part may be painful to read, particularly for those who may have had (or whose parents or grandparents may have had) association with some of the principals of the failed financial ventures.

Yet the motto of Colonial Williamsburg, "that the future may learn from the past," should underscore the importance of this work.

In H.I.'s Journal, faith and family are the firm foundations. Even when alarmed by war or shaken by economic distress, a sure confidence shines through in the protection of God's Providence and Providence's manifestation through the bonds of kinship close and far.

While many of the items are not of great significance, some certainly are – and some are just interesting from a Glattfelder's perspective.

As I've commented to our Directors on occasion, when sifting through our Archives, I almost always find something that draws and holds my attention. Some are important; some are just interesting.

A guide for Glattfelden

(Editor's note: Koni Ulrich has been a contact for Glattfelder descendants visiting Glattfelden for many years. Here, he offers some advice for those visiting in the future. While the Association is planning to organize a trip for September 2024, we're including the guide a second time for those who may visit our homeland in the interim.)

At the old and protected part of Glattfelden in the canton of Zurich, only a few meters from here, we usually welcome our guests in the Cultural Centre of the town. The Protestant church is very close and a walk to the Glatt takes only five minutes. Don't miss it!

Going back to 1985 -- and even further -smaller and bigger groups of U.S. Glattfelders have been visiting Switzerland about every year. Most of them have been guided by Koni Ulrich, 73, and our friend Henry Glattfelder, 79, son of Dr. Hans Glattfelder, who once initialized and renewed the relation between the United States and Switzerland, concerning their relatives by the same name.

Most of our guided tours of Glattfelden over the years have included our mayor. In the last eight years, this has been Ernst Gassmann. Some of you might remember Pier-Luigi Quattropani, who came to the 100th reunion in 2005, together



with Koni and Henry and Myrtha Glattfelder, and did some yodeling.

Usually, people want to spend one or half a day in Glattfelden. You can reach the town from Zurich by public transportation (train S9 and bus from Glattfelden Station to town). A walk from the Glattfelder train station to the town along the Glatt takes less than an hour.

Here are some things to do while in Glattfelden:

- -- Tour of the Cultural Centre of town, with the main house being almost 500 years old.
- -- Walk around town, including the wooden bridge over the Glatt, cemetery and church, in

collaboration with the pastors. The church is where Casper was baptized and married.

- -- Lunch at the community-owned restaurant, Il Duetto, formerly Guesthouse Lion.
- -- Visit the resort Riverside at the Glatt, with restaurants, exhibitions, bowling and hotel rooms. (a 40-minute walk).

Trip to Glattfelden

Planning has begun for a tour to Europe next year that will include Glattfelden, Switzerland.

Deb Krebs, a Glattfelder descendant of Felix through her mother, is organizing the trip for the second time. She also organized the trip to Switzerland that was done in 2019.

The tour is currently scheduled for Sept. 20-27, 2024, and includes stops in Zurich, Switzerland; Strasbourg, France; and Speyer, Mannheim and Cologne, Germany, ending in Amsterdam, Netherlands. Planning is being done to add two days at the beginning of the tour to stay in Zurich

and visit Glattfelden, leaving the USA on Sept. 17, 2024. The price for this is TBA.

Prices for the River Cruise Tour range from \$4,300-\$7,500. The cost for the nine-day trip includes airfare, 20 meals and the seven-night cruise on the MS Amadeus Brilliant on the Rhine and Moselle rivers.

News and notes

• As a contributor to the program for the 2021 Reunion, which was Part I of "Glattfelders and their Patents," John Glatfelter spoke about his many patents – he recently reached 40 patents – along with the accomplishments of his father, Edward W. Glatfelter, both highly influential in the aviation industry.

Among Edward's patents was the development of the Glaticopter, which is on display at the

American Helicopter Museum in West Chester, Pa.

In February – on one of our numerous days when it felt more like April or May – John met directors Harry Gladfelter, Larry Gladfelter Jr. and Philip Glatfelter at the museum. While the museum itself gives a nice look at helicopters and their history, John was able to give us a much deeper understanding of the aviation industry.

Living in nearby Kennett Square, he is in the Philadelphia region that is one of the cradles of helicopter development and manufacturing in the United States.

The Glaticopter came about from Edward's desire to take things apart and put them back together to see how they work. The XRG-65 Glaticopter was "intended to evaluate new ideas in rotor control and drive systems." It's first flight was in 1958 in Phoenixville, Pa.

• In the April 2021 Newsletter, one of the photos in the "Glattfelder Places" section was of Glatfelter Memorial Field in Columbia, Pa.

Not long after that photo was taken, the group that oversees the field, the Glatfelter Memorial Field Trust, began the process of restoring the park's entry gate.

The project has been completed and on June 4 at 2 p.m., there will be a dedication ceremony.

The board recently sought donations to help the funding for the project, as noted in a February 15 story in the Columbia/Hellam/Wrightsville Merchandiser. Deadline for donations was Feb. 28.

The brick entrance was built in 1937 by the Glatfelter family in honor of Lt. Richard Glatfelter, a Columbia High School and U.S. Military Academy at West Point graduate. He died in a car accident during his first assignment at Fort Dix, N.J.

His father, David L. Glatfelter, donated the land to memorialize his son. The field was built by the Works Progress Administration during the Depression. It included a football field, a baseball field and tennis courts.

The property now includes five baseball fields, a football field, a street hockey rink where the tennis courts formerly stood, a track and a pavilion.

In addition to the June 4 dedication, there will be a Food Truck Extravaganza on May 4 and a golf outing in September. Among the Glatfelter Memorial Field Trust board members is Carl Glatfelter, son of former Association Vice President Philip H. Glatfelter.
